The crisp clear air is wonderful and guess what? The mosquitoes should be gone soon. This month we celebrate pumpkins and apples, asters and chrysanthemums ending with Halloween. It is the time when nature gets ready for winter including bees and birds making their preparations for the cold weather. Help them out if you can by preparing a healthy habitat for them. You will be rewarded with many more flowers and fruits in the **spring** and the joy of watching wildlife in your yard.

This year, we rescued a young teenage squirrel we named "Nutty" who probably fell from a tree. We took him to the Mercer County Wildlife Center and they nursed him back to health. We picked him up two weeks later to release him back in our yard. Now in reality, I am not a fan of squirrels in general but "Nutty" is super cute! He comes to visit often and we are so happy he is home.

This month, we have a Program on wildlife entitled: "Attracting Birds to Your Garden" by George Fore owner of Wild Birds Unlimited. This will fit in perfectly with our Butterflies and BeeGAP Project and creating habitat in our community.

Please bring in another item for "Show and Tell" in preparation for our Spring Flower Show. This could be anything you choose from a craft to a plant (botanical name) to a scrap book page. Have fun!

Gardening Tip: This is the time to begin to make preparations for the **winter** by removing spent annuals and composting and mulching gardens. You can also collect seeds for next year but leave some for the birds as well. I usually leave the seed heads in the garden as well as some nesting materials. These items can be composted as well as leaves and potting soils. Also consider planting some Bee/Butterfly Picks for next year and some seeds such as foxglove can be planted now.

To follow up on my theme of "Choices make Changes" (TM pending), please consider creating habitat in your garden for the creatures who share our space with us. You will need food and water and shelter. As you make your gardening decisions, keep this in mind. It is estimated that the monarch butterfly population is down 90% and the bee population is suffering badly as well from colony collapse.

For our anti-aging tip this month, I ask you to try honey as your sweetener choice if you can. **Anne Chmielewski** mentioned this last month so I thought I would include honey here as a powerful antioxidant and antimicrobial, probiotic and wound healing agent! It tastes good too. Thanks Anne! It is the pleasure we feel at the accomplishments of our friends that lifts us up to a new place. We can choose to go there with them or go to a new place with a new joyful view.

Looking forward to seeing all of you in October for our Program "Attracting Birds to Your Garden"! Enjoy the color changing leaves.

SHOW TITLE: JERSEY BLOOMS

DRAFT - DIVISION I - Horticulture: NJ – "The Garden State"

This division is named after beautiful and educational gardens in NJ - so many to visit!

All classes in this Division are eligible for the Award of Horticultural Excellence and the Millija Lovett Horticultural Award.

<u>SECTION A</u> - "*RUTGERS GARDENS, NEW BRUNSWICK, NJ*" CONTAINER-GROWN FLOWERING PLANTS Eligible for Grower's Choice Award

Flowers must be in bloom

- Class 1 Orchid (Orchid) One plant per container, container not to exceed 12" in diameter
- Class 2 Saintpaulia (African Violet) One plant per container, container not to exceed 12" in diameter

Class 3 - Any Other Container-Grown Flowering Plant

- **a.** Container under 6" in diameter
 - **b.** Container 6" to 12" in diameter

<u>SECTION B</u> - *"WICK HOUSE HERB GARDEN, MORRISTOWN, NJ"* COMBINATION PLANTINGS Eligible for Crower's Choice Award

Eligible for Grower's Choice Award

Combination plantings must have been grown together and in the exhibitor's possession for at least six weeks. Minimum of three plants required, a 4" x 6" card required to diagram and list binomial plant names. Staging determined by Committee. All classes viewed from the front.

SHOW TITLE: JERSEY BLOOMS

DRAFT - DIVISION I - Horticulture: NJ – "The Garden State"—Continued

Class 4 - A Planter of All Foliage Plants

A planter with a minimum of three plants grown primarily for foliage. Not a landscape, accessories not permitted. Container, provided by the exhibitor, maximum of 16" in diameter. No height restriction.

Class 5 - A Dish Garden of Cacti and/or Succulents

A miniature landscape with a minimum of three compatible plants growing together in an open container, provided by exhibitor, staged on a 12" square table space. Accessories permitted.

Class 6 - A Dish Garden of Foliage and/or Flowering Plants

A miniature landscape with a minimum of three compatible plants growing together in an open container, provided by exhibitor, staged on a 12" square table space. Accessories permitted.

Class 7 - A Terrarium

A miniature landscape with a minimum of three compatible plants growing together in a transparent container, provided by exhibitor, staged on a 15" square table space. Accessories permitted. Plant list and diagram required on a 4" x 6" card.

- a. WTGC Challenge Class various plants provided by WTGC at workshop in March (container provided by exhibitor).
 - **b.** All other Terrariums

<u>SECTION C</u> - *"HUNTERDON COUNTY ARBORETUM, LEBANON, NJ"* CONTAINER-GROWN FOLIAGE PLANTS

Eligible for Grower's Choice Award

One plant per container. with the exception of Class 9. No container larger than 12" in diameter accepted in Section.

Class 8 - Herbs

- **a.** Container under 6" in diameter
- **b.** Container 6" to 12" in diameter

Class 9 - Single Parent - 2 plants, a single plant, along with the parent plant from which it was propagated, both in the same container.

- **a.** Container under 6" in diameter
- b. Container 6" to 12" in diameter

Class 10 - Any Other Container-Grown Foliage Plant

- **a.** Container under 6" in diameter
- **b.** Container 6" to 12" in diameter

<u>SECTION D</u>- "GROUNDS FOR SCULPTURE, HAMILTON, NJ" CACTI AND OTHER SUCCULENTS Eligible for Award of Merit

Class 11 - Container 4" in diameter & under.

- **a**. Cacti
- **b**. Other Succulents
- Class 12 Container 5" to 8" in diameter
 - **a**. Cacti
 - b. Other Succulents

Class 13 - Container 9" to 16" in diameter

- **a**. Cacti
- **b**. Other Succulents

<u>SECTION E</u> - "NJ STATE BOTANICAL GARDEN, RINGWOOD, NJ" FLOWERING HERBACEOUS PERENNIALS Eligible for Award of Merit

One cut stem with attached foliage unless otherwise noted, 4" to 18" in length.

Class 14 - *Dicentra* (Bleeding Heart) Class 15 - *Iberis* (Candytuft) Class 16 - *Lunaria* (Honesty) Class 17 - Any Other Cut Flowering Herbaceous Perennial

<u>SECTION F</u> - *"WARINUNCO PARK GARDENS, ROSELLE, NJ"* BULBS, CORMS, RHIZOMES AND TUBERS Eligible for Award of Merit <u>Once cut stem</u> if large, 3 if small.

Eligible for Arboreal Award One cut branch measuring 10" to 30" in length with several nodes and apical tip.

Class 24 - *Cornus* (Dogwood) Class 25 - *R. Azalea* (Azalea) Class 26 - *Rhododendon* (Rhododendron) Class 27 - Any Other Cut Coned, Flowering or Fruited Branch

<u>SECTION H</u> - *"WILLOWWOOD ARBORETUM, CHESTER, NJ"* BRANCHES GROWN FOR FOLIAGE - EVERGREENS Eligible for Arboreal Award

One cut branch 10" to 30" in length with several nodes and apical tip, includes needled and broadleaf specimens.

Class 28 - *Buxus* (Boxwood) Class 29 - *Ilex* (Holly) - Unfruited Class 30 - *Juniperus* (Juniper)
